

The Reading Corner.

Professional reading can sometimes take a back seat as you go about your daily tasks. As assistance to your reading list, we have provided three suggestions to enhance your understanding of parents and family involvement in higher education.

Napper, L.E., Grimaldi, E.M., & LaBrie, J.W. Parents' and students' perceptions of college alcohol risk: The role parental risk perception in intentions to communicate about alcohol. Addictive Behaviors. 2014 42C: 114-118 DOI: 10.1016/j.addbeh.2014.10.035

Examining the discrepancies in parents' and students' perceptions of alcohol risk, Professor Napper and his colleagues were able to provide data with what most in student affairs consider to be true. The study measured seven alcohol-related consequences (Say or do embarrassing things, throwing up, regrettable sexual situations, passing out, alcohol poisoning, poor academic performance, problems with others). What is particularly interesting is that students and their parents viewed the risk in similar order of seriousness; however, parents viewed the consequences to be more severe than their students did.

Another finding was being able to predict a parents' intention to communicate with their student. This study contradicts one from 2008, in that "the results of the current study suggest that perceiving the risks of alcohol to be likely, rather than more severe, is a more important motivator of intentions to communicate for parents of college students" (p117). The last sentence of the article gives practitioners advice. "The current results also reveal a number of potential ways college personnel can motivate parents to talk to their college-age children about alcohol. Informing parents about the likelihood of drinking consequences and the fact that parents typically hold inaccurate beliefs about their own child's drinking may help promote greater likelihood estimates and less certainty of their child's drinking, thereby prompting greater alcohol-related communication" (p. 118).

Students do not always remember what their parents tell me, but sometimes they do. This study used content analysis to determine the five most memorable messages that first-generation students remember before going off to college. Those message themes are: "including (a) remembering family, (b) focusing on family, (c) counting on family, (d) not worrying about family, and (e) setting a good example" (p.270). That information can be of assistance to practitioners in at least two ways: 1. Knowing what is important to first-generation parents and messaging to that, and 2. Knowing what first generation students hear and it could impact how services are provided.


