### NASPA ASSESSMENT & PERSISTENCE CONFERENCE PROGRAM TRACKS

### FOUNDATIONAL

Designed for professionals new to assessment and persistence, these sessions will cover the basics of developing and writing a learning outcome, designing assessment plans, connecting assessment to retention and student persistence, and more.

### INTERMEDIATE

Academic and student affairs professionals who have some experience with assessment will explore new ways to use assessment to improve student learning in both academic and student affairs and move from individual program assessment to integrating assessment as an institutional focus. Retention/persistence professionals that have established programs and services focused on student persistence should attend sessions labeled as "intermediate."

### **ADVANCED**

Professionals who have broad experience with assessment/persistence programs will focus on the next exciting steps in assessment practice, including: integrating learning and assessment across students' experiences; using learning taxonomies and knowledge of student and brain development to guide assessment efforts; the creative blending of assessment methods; and using assessment methods to support institutional data analysis, policy making, and resource decisions.

### PROFESSIONAL COMPETENCIES FOR STUDENT AFFAIRS PRACTITIONERS

In July 2015, the NASPA Board of Directors approved Professional Competency Areas for Student Affairs Practitioners. ### Tia Brown McNair

Vice President for Diversity, Equity, and Student Success, Association of American Colleges & Universities

Dr. Tia Brown McNair is the Vice President in the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Student Success at Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) in Washington, DC. She oversees both funded projects and AAC&U's continuing programs on equity, inclusive excellence, high-impact educational practices, and student success, including AAC&U's Network for Academic Renewal series of yearly working conferences. McNair also directs AAC&U's Summer Institute on High-Impact Educational Practices and Student Success. McNair serves as the project director for several AAC&U initiatives: "Truth, Racial Healing and Transformation," "Committing to Equity and Inclusive Excellence: Campus-Based Strategies for Student Success," and Purposeful Pathways: Faculty Planning and Curricular Coherence." She directed AAC&U's projects on "Advancing Underserved Student Success through Faculty Intentionality in Problem-Centered Learning," "Advancing Roadmaps for Community College Leadership to Improve Student Learning and Success," and "Developing a Community College Roadmap. McNair chaired AAC&U's Equity Working Group that was part of the General Education Maps and Markers (GEMs) project that represented a large-scale, systematic effort to provide "design principles" for 21stcentury learning and long-term student success. She is the lead author of the book Becoming a Student-Ready College: A New Culture of Leadership for Student Success (July 2016). McNair is a co-author on the publication Assessing Underserved Students' Engagement in High-Impact Practices.

Prior to joining AAC&U, McNair served as the Assistant Director of the National College Access Network (NCAN) in Washington, DC. McNair's previous experience also includes serving as a Social Scientist/Assistant Program Director in the Directorate for Education and Human Resources at the National Science Foundation (NSF), Director of University Relations at the University of Charleston in Charleston, West Virginia; the Statewide Coordinator for the Educational Talent Search Project at the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission; and the Interim Associate Director of Admissions and Recruitment Services at West Virginia State University. She has served as an adjunct faculty member at several institutions where she taught first-year English courses. McNair earned her bachelor's degree in political science and English at James Madison University and holds an M.A. in English from Radford University and a doctorate in higher education administration from George Washington University.

### **Stephanie Marken**

Chief Methodologist, Gallup

Stephanie Marken is the Chief Methodologist of the U.S. Gallup Poll as well as the sampling and design architect for Gallup's largest education studies including the Gallup Purdue Index and the Strada-Gallup Education Consumer Survey. This work is designed to inform higher education leaders, policy-makers and the public about the long-term outcomes of a college degree, and the individual collegiate experiences that are most directly related to positive outcomes. To date, Stephanie has worked with more 100 higher education universities and organizations to design and conduct studies measuring student and alumni outcomes.



Stephanie received her bachelor's degree in political science from Elon University and her master's degree in survey research from the University of Connecticut.

### **Amelia Parnell**

### Vice President for Research and Policy, NASPA

Dr. Amelia Parnell is vice president for research and policy. She directs the Research and Policy Institute (RPI), which links research, policy, and effective student affairs practice in support of student success. Amelia is leading NASPA's examination of several critical higher education issues, including colleges' use of emergency aid programs to address student needs. Prior to her arrival at NASPA, Amelia was director of research initiatives at the Association for Institutional Research (AIR), where she conducted two national studies related to future directions of the institutional research function. Her current research portfolio also includes studies on leadership attributes of college presidents and vice presidents, documenting and assessing co-curricular learning, and assessment and evaluation in student affairs. Amelia is co-editor of the forthcoming book, The Analytics Revolution. She is an advisory board member for the DC Public Schools' Urban Education Leaders Internship Program Alumni Board and an advisory committee member for Lumina Foundation's Beyond Financial Aid toolkit. Amelia holds a Ph.D. in higher education from Florida State University and masters and bachelor's degrees in business administration from Florida A & M University.

Dr. Stephanie Gordon serves as the vice president for professional development at NASPA - Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education. She supervises a professional development team at the largest, most comprehensive student affairs association in the United States.

Purdue University designed an innovative data collection tool in Banner that assesses the retention and academic performance of LGBTQIA+ college students. Along with rich data from over 6,000 students, it revealed that 27% of LGBTQIA+ Purdue undergraduates, compared to 16% of all Purdue undergraduates, are at risk of failing to complete their degrees. The presenter will provide an overview of the implementation of the data collection system, and lead a discussion of barriers and strategies for closing the achievement gap for LGBTQIA+ students.

### DASH: A New Framework for Division-wide Assessment Implementation

Using data from multiple sources and working with graduate assistants from statistics and computer science, persistence models with predictive, and more importantly, prescriptive analytics for the freshman cohort were produced and refined. Based on the outcomes from the modeling, secondary support structures were identified, strategies were constructed, and systems were put in place to monitor persistence of students impacted by the strategies. At the conclusion of the registration period, the analytical model was evaluated and refined for improved accuracy. 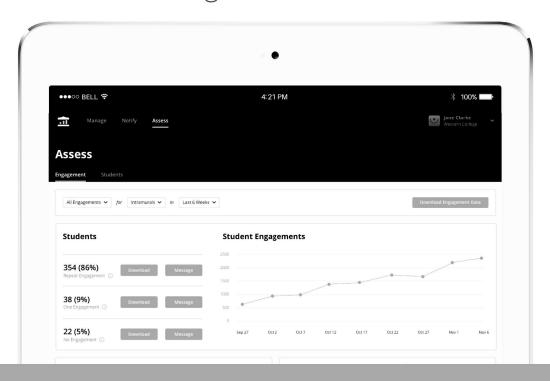

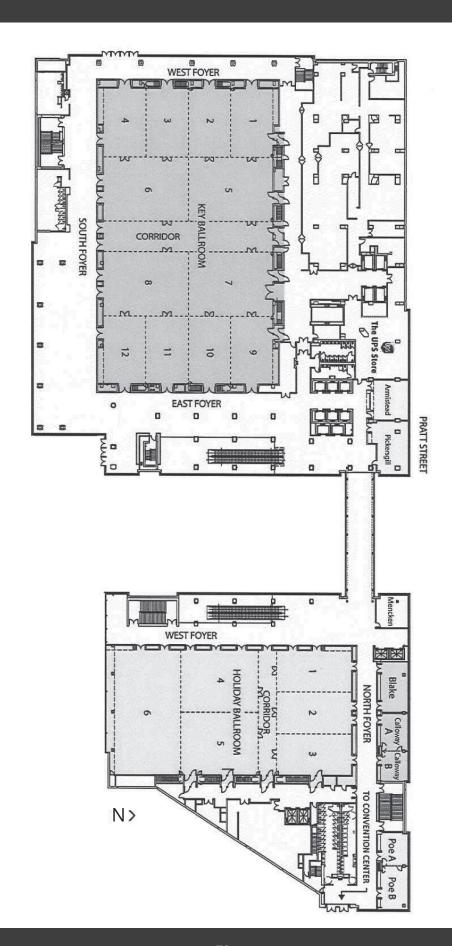
