She received an Ed.D. in Educational Leadership from the University of California, Los Angeles, a Master of Counseling from California State University, Long Beach and a Bachelor of Arts in Sociology from California State University, San Marcos.

Dr. Joy Hoffman serves as the Director of Diversity Initiatives and Resource Centers at California State University, Fullerton (CSUF). She oversees the African American Resource Center, Asian Pacific American Resource Center, Chicana & Chicano Resource Center, Titan Dreamers Resource Center, and LGBT Queer Resource Center. She is also responsible for diversity initiatives on campus, including trainings, workshops, campus climate evaluation, contributing to conversations around policies and processes, and bias response. Her 23-year

career includes working at four different institutions.



Dr. Cecilia Santiago-Gonzalez is the inaugural Director of Enrollment and One-Stop Services at Cal Poly Pomona. In her role, she is responsible for developing a one-stop enrollment student center that provides higher level of efficient, personalized and responsive services for students doing business with the university. Blending a high tech/high touch approach, the One Stop Center provides a holistic approach to information and problem solving that transcends office boundaries and reflects the manner in which students expect

to receive information and services critical to their success.

Over her experience in student affairs and higher education, Cecilia has led numerous departments and initiatives focused on fostering equitable, supportive, and validating learning environments. In 2009, she was the Associate Director for Student Support Services at the Art Center College of Design. Before her tenure at Art Center, she was the Coordinator of the Cesar E. Chavez Center for Higher Education at Cal Poly Pomona from 2005 to 2009 and the Associate Director of the Cultural Center and Director of the Ortiz Programs at Whittier College from 2003 to 2005.
