

Massachusetts Institute of Technology

In September 2013, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Division of Student Life (DSL) Assessment Planning Group announced an eight-session Brown Bag Assessment Lunch & Learn series. The series is designed to take DSL staff through the assessment cycle, and is structured in a manner that builds on the subject matter of previous sessions. At the conclusion of the series, our goal is for DSL staff members to have a solid foundation of assessment knowledge, as well as a variety of tools to implement that knowledge in their daily work. As we build capacity within the Division, the Assessment Planning Group is committed to promoting a collaborative and supportive culture of assessment. To that end, each session will be led and facilitated by a DSL staff member who is knowledgeable and experienced in a particular area of assessment. The series is open to all DSL staff members, and serves as a great example of a professional development opportunity provided and supported by the Division of Student Life. We had our first session in October, and were very encouraged by the number of attendees. We had over 35 people attend, representing staff members from all 5 "sub-areas" of the Division of Student Life. We look forward to a successful year ahead, and to building an army of assessment gurus! The eight topics covered in the series are: Intro to Assessment & Campus Labs; Creating Meaningful Goals & Outcomes; Data Collection & Methodologies – Focus Groups, Surveys & Rubrics; Sharing & Using Data; Using Assessment Results for Resource Planning; and Assessment Stories - Lightning Rounds. Online Education Marlin Nabors, Southern New Hampshire University

When it comes to higher education, institution type can mean everything. For both students and faculty and certainly for student affairs professionals; the administrative structure, the mission, affiliation, or size can greatly impact our desire to be educated at or work for a certain college. An ugly by-product of our making meaningful distinctions between environments is that we then pass great judgment on the educational settings that don't match our preferences. Nowhere is this more pronounced or more present than the online learning environment.

Let's be clear. We judge. Is it for profit? How can you provide service to someone across the country? Will people respect the degree? Is this a threat to traditional college campuses?

An evolution on coming to terms with massive online open courses and online education can take some time. If you visit the College of Continuing Education at Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU), you may be awed by the sea of cubicles – the new professionals working odd and long hours in order to cross time zones and speak with the non-traditional student. It's easy to question this construct because it is different, it is unknown. As a human race, our history has taught us that we tend to respond well to the different and unfamiliar. Right?

In any case, online education is here to stay. It provides an on-ramp to higher education for folks who may otherwise assume they've missed some sort of invisible window of opportunity. If you listen to SNHU President Paul LeBlanc, you might become a believer. President LeBlanc is passionate about the staggering disparity in social mobility between those with a college education and those without. He speaks with conviction when he highlights what he would describe as the one enduring game changer for any person in society – an education.

It would be hard to begrudge an educator like him, who so passionately seeks to bring social justice to the fore-front of the national conversation on education. Still, somehow we have doubts. We still question what this approach does to our worth.

It would seem then, that the traditional college environment is facing a little bit of a self-esteem issue.

The traditional college environment and student affairs professionals who work there have a unique and timetested goal – to educate "the whole person." Just ask Region 1 student affairs history expert Dr. Daryl Healea. He recently spoke to the student affairs professionals at SNHU, a group that could easily feel threatened as the online education approach is quickly growing right down the hall. What we can learn from our history is that throughout time we have offered a unique experience. We not only provide academic rigor for career preparation, we also provide a training ground for citizenship.

Online education provides mobility to people who have learned life's lessons in other ways. They had children, they took care of a family member, they joined the service, or they found themselves despite the absence of mentorship and guidance.

Lucky for us, there will always be a segment of the population who need mentorship and guidance in a controlled environment. Lucky for us, some people continue to choose education and maturation as a combined effort. With that opportunity, we have the privilege of teaching values and challenging convention, supporting growth and inspiring change. We offer something different. Something valuable. Something to be proud of.

There are some times to be afraid of the unknown. This is not one of them. Online education is a partner in social justice and education. We'd be well served to recognize their contributions to society as we continue to prove our own.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS FOR STATE/INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR!

NASPA Region I is currently seeking candidates for the next State Director for Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Vermont as well as for the International Director. This individual will represent their state on the Region I Advisory Board from March 2014 to March 2016. The State Director is the steward of the state association, and through their service ensures the continuation of an effective and quality professional association during a two-year term.

The State Director provides state leadership in NASPA Region I, and represents the interests of student affairs professionals in their home state to the Region I Advisory Board. The State Director also plays a key role in the recruitment and retention of NASPA members within the state.

Additional responsibilities include:

Make appointments from the state's membership to the state board and various other leadership teams.

Explore and develop opportunities for networking and professional development activities. Some examples are coordinating drive-in conferences, co-sponsoring conferences or workshops with other associations or NASPA groups, and providing other programs congruent with NASPA's strategic plan.

Provide information about the benefits of a NASPA membership at state events.

Support the regional and national initiatives of NASPA.

Convey information to the state's membership, as requested. This includes ensuring that the state's website is current and regular contributions to the Regional Newsletter are submitted.

Encourage institutional and professional memberships.

Serve as liaison with leaders from other professional associations.

Provide reports about state activities at Region I Advisory Board meetings, and submit a written report to the Region I Director prior to each NASPA Board of Directors meeting (three times per year).

Collaborate with the Knowledge Communities on programming.

Attend all Region I Advisory Board meetings.

Other duties as assigned by the Region I Director.

Any current member of NASPA may submit a nomination on behalf of herself or himself, or a colleague from their respective state. All nominees must be current NASPA members.

To place your own name or a colleague's name in nomination, please submit the following materials to Region I's Nominations Committee by 5 pm, Monday, December 2, 2013:

Biographical Information and Résumé

Please send the candidate's name, title, institution, mailing address, phone number, email address, and a current résumé. The résumé should be submitted as a Word document or pdf attachment. Please note that if the candidate is selected for the ballot, the résumé will appear in its entirety. It will not be edited by the NASPA staff. There is no need to include personal contact information or a list of references.

Digital photo

A standard electronic headshot would be most appropriate. If a black-and-white photo is sent, it would appear on the ballot as a black-and-white photo. If a color photo is sent, it would appear on the ballot as a color photo.

Candidate Statement

The statement should clearly and concisely articulate the candidate's philosophy of work in student affairs and vision for NASPA in their state. The word limit is 500-700 words. Paragraph breaks may be inserted where they are needed. If the candidate is selected for the ballot, her or his statement will not be edited by the NASPA staff, so it should be carefully proofread before being sent to the Nominations Committee. The statement should be submitted as a Word document.

The materials (biographical information and résumé, digital photo, and candidate statement) should be sent together via one email to the Nominations Committee (attention Alison Black, naspar1awards@gmail.com) by 5 pm, Monday, December 2, 2013.

After reviewing all nominees' materials, the Nominations Committee will select two candidates to place on the ballot. All nominees will be notified of the outcome of the nomination process on or about Friday, December 6, 2013.



Ballots will be emailed to the state membership in January, and election results will be announced in February. The State Director's term begins in March 2014.
